CIRCUIT COURT.

On Monday last the Circuit Court of the United States was opened in this town. The Hon. Judge PATTERSON presided. After the Jury were empanelled, the Judge delivered a most elegant and appropriate Charge.— The Law was laid down in a masterly manner; *Falsities* were set in their true light, by holding up the Jacobins, as the disorganizers of our happy Country; and the only instruments of introducing discontent and dissatisfaction among the well-meaning part of the Community;— *Religion & Morality* were pleasingly inculcated and enforced, as being necessary to good government, good order and good laws, for "when the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice."
