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#### ASTRONOMICAL CHARACTERS.

Names and Characters of the Planets.

The Sun, which is not properly a Planet, but of the nature of a fixed Star, is the source and centre of light and heat to the whole Solar System.

Americary, which moves round the Sun in 87 days, and is the nearest Planet to it, emits a very bright white light: he appears a little after sunset, and

again a little before funrise.

days, is the most beautiful Star in the Heavens. She is never seen in the eastern quarter of the Heavens when the Sun is in the western; but always seems to attend him in the evening, or to give notice of his approach in the morning. This Planet will be the Morning Star from January 1st, to May 28th. From that time she will be the Evening Star until the end of the year.

The Earth, not usually reckoned among the Planets, though it is one, moving round the Sun in 365 days.

The Moon, moving round the Earth, in about 28

days, and going with it round the Sun.

Mars, next above the Earth, moves round the Sun in 687 days, it is of a red fiery colour, and always gives a much duller light than Venus, though sometimes he equals her in size,

If Jupiter, next above Mars, moves round the Sun in about twelve years; the largest of all the Planets,

and is attended with four moons.

tended with seven moons, most of them larger than the Earth, moves round the Sun in about 30 years. Jupiter and Saturn likewise often appear at great distances from the Sun. The sormer shines with a bright white light, and the latter with a pale faint one: and the motion of Saturn among the fixed Stars is so slow, that, unless carefully observed, he will not be thought to move at all.

Herschell. This planet was not discovered till March 13, 1781; it was attended with several moons, is eighty times larger than the Earth, and does not complete a revolution in a less time than

eighty-two years.

MILITARY ESTABLISHMENTS of the United States.

The military establishments of the United States are to consist of a corps of artillerists and engineers of 992 non commissioned officers, privates, and musicians; and of a legion to consist of 4800 non-commissioned

officers privates and mulicians.

Every non-commissioned officer, private, and musician of the artillery and infantry, are to receive annually, one hat or helmet, one coat, one vest, two pair of wollen and two pair of linnen overhalls, sour pair of shoes, four shirts, two pair of socks, one blanket, one stock and class, and one pair of buckles. To the cavalry and rislemen, such cloathing as shall be most suitable and best adapted to the nature of the service.

Every non-commissioned officer, private, and musician, is to receive the following rations of provision, to wit, one pound of beef, or three quarters of a pound of pork, one pound of bread or flour, half a gill of rum, brandy or whisky, and at the rate of one quart of salt, two quarts of vinegar, two pounds of soap, and one pound of candles to every hundred rations, or the val-

ue thereof.

Any person conceasing or enticing a soldier to desert, or purchase of him his uniform cloathing, or masters of vessels shipping them on board, are liable, upon conviction, to a fine not exceeding 300 dollars, or be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one year.
