ECLIPSES in the Year 1800.

THERE will be four ECLIPSES in the Year 1800.

1. The first will be of the Moon, on the 9th of April; invisible.

2. The second will be of the Sun, April 23d, invisible in Vermont.

3. On October the 2d there will a small Eclipse of the Moon. The Eclipse will end at 6 o'clock P M and therefore scarcely visible.

4. The fourth will be of the Sun, October 17 invisible in this part of America.

The United States of America.

—

Boundaries and Extent. THE territory belonging to the United States of America, is bounded on the north by upper & lower Canada; east, by the Provinces of New Brunswick, and Atlantic Ocean; south, by East and West Florida; west by the Mississippi river. Its north line which separates it from Canada, is about 1400 miles in length in a due east and west course; its southern line is about 600 miles in length; its medium breadth north and south is about 1030 miles. The whole surface of this territory is reckoned at a million square miles, or 640 millions of acres; of which 57 millions are supposed to be water.

This extensive country lies between Lat. $30^{\circ} 20'$ and $48^{\circ} 15'$ N. Lat., and between 64° and 96° W. Longitude from London.

Division, Population, and Chief Towns. The American Republic is composed of sixteen independant states, confederated under one general form of government, and may naturally be classed in three divisions, viz, Northern or Eastern, Middle and Southern States—as follows:

Rivers. The largest rivers that border upon, or pass through the United States, are the Mississippi, the Ohio, and Tennessee, on the West of the Allegany mountains, and the Altamaha, Savannah, Santee, Cape Fear, Roanoke, James, Potowmack, Susquehannah, Delaware, Hudson, Connecticut, Merrimack, Piscataqua, Androscoggin, Kennebeck, and Penobscot, whose general courses are from N. W. and N. to S. E., and S. and fall into the Atlantic Ocean.

Animals. The territory of the United States contains about one fourth of the number of species of quadruped animals in the known world. Some of them are common to North America, and the European and Atlantic parts of the eastern continent; other parts are peculiar to this country.

Birds. No less than 271 species of Birds have been found and described by the inhabitants of the United States. They generally exceed those of Europe in the beauty of their plumage; but are said to be much inferior to them in the melody of their voices.

Government. The United States constitute what may with strict propriety be called a REPUBLIC. It consists of fifteen separate, independant States, having governors, constitutions and laws of their own, united under one general, federal constitution of government, administered by an elective head, and by a proportionate number of Representatives of the people from all the different states.
